Curriculum This Month

French: We will be continuing vocabulary development by completing a unit based on the book <u>The Mitten</u> by Jan Brett. We will do guided story writing using action words, physical descriptions, places and feelings. We will continue to write in our journals, moving towards independent writing. We will continue to add descriptive words to our writing. In reading, we will continue with sound blend themes. Home reading will see the beginning of a new program where students will be choosing "best fit books" (books at their reading stage) and reading them at home.

Math: We will continue our focus on numbers from 0-100. Counting forwards to 100, backwards from 20-0, by 10's to 100, skip counting by 2's to 20, by 5's to 50, counting on from a given number and identifying numbers out of sequence. We will also look at concepts of measurement, addition and subtraction.

Science: We continue our look at the five senses and seasonal changes in winter.

Socials: We will be exploring our rights and responsibilities at home, at school and in our community.

Art: We will examine printmaking and photography.

Gym: We will explore movement through various types of cooperative games.

Health: Physical Differences & Similarities (hair colour, eye colour, height).

Literacy Corner Reading Accurately

Reading Accurately Using Beginning and Ending Sounds

When learning to read, students often focus only on the first letter of the word and guess at the rest, resulting in inaccurate reading that they can't make sense of. When this happens, reading the beginning and ending letter sounds will help your child read the whole word.

Here are some ways to support your child when they read the first letter and guess at the rest:


Have your child slow down.

Encourage your child point to the first and last letters of the word.

Stop your child at the end of the sentence or page and ask them if what they read made sense. (This can be tricky for our learners who are acquiring a second language!) In this case, ask them to look at the picture to make sure the word they read matches what is happening in the story.

Tackle the word by writing it in large letters on a piece of paper.

Ensure that your child is able to make the sound of the letter. A PowerPoint presentation is available on our class webpage if practice is needed.



Numeracy Corner Problem Solving

What is a Problem?

A problem is a question that motivates you to search for a solution. This implies first that you want or need to solve the problem and second that you have to search for a way to find a solution. Whether a question is a problem or an exercise depends on the prior knowledge of the problem solver.

What is Problem Solving?

Mathematical problem solving is about finding solutions and not just answers to mathematical problems. We say that

method + answer = solution.


We believe that there are four steps that you need to go through in solving most mathematical problems. These are:

- understand and explore the problem
- find a strategy
- · use the strategy to solve the problem
- look back and reflect on the solution.

Why Teach Problem Solving?

There are many benefits to teaching problem solving. These include:

- it bases students' mathematical development on their current knowledge
- it is an interesting and enjoyable way to learn mathematics
- it is a way to learn new mathematics with greater understanding
- it produces positive attitudes towards mathematics
- it teaches thinking, flexibility and creativity
- it encourages co-operative skills
- it is a useful way to practice mathematical skills learned by other means
